David Theo Goldberg is the Director of the University of California Humanities Research Institute and Professor of African-American Studies at the University of California, Irvine. Formerly Director and Professor of the School of Justice Studies at Arizona State University, he is the author of numerous books, including *Racial Subjects: Writing on Race in America* and *The Racial State*. He edited *Anatomy of Racism* and *Multiculturalism: A Critical Reader* and co-edited *Race Critical Theories* and *Rethinking Postcolonialism*.

Philomena Essed is Senior Researcher at the Amsterdam Institute for Metropolitan and International Development Studies at the University of Amsterdam and Visiting Professor of Women's Studies at the University of California, Irvine. Trained in Social Anthropology, Women's Studies and in Race Critical Studies her research and teaching transcends national, cultural and disciplinary boundaries. Her monographs include *Understanding Everyday Racism* and *Diversity: Gender, Color and Culture*. She co-edited *Race Critical Theories*, *Refugees and the Transformation of Societies*, and *A Companion to Gender Studies*.
